Thank you for your interest in the OCRCC! I couldn't be more proud of the work we do, and want to take a moment to describe what your support means.

Year after year, the OCRCC delivers on 1 key promise- to be there for survivors as they navigate the moments, choices, opportunities and challenges that emerge after breaking the silence surrounding sexual violence. Whether it's clinical support, showing up at a legal proceedings, or sitting in a quiet room to help calm the fears, we are there for survivors every step of the way. Sometimes we encounter a survivor in the hours after an assault- sometimes 15 years later. In either case, our goal is the same: to provide help, hope and healing, whatever that looks like for them.

But our mission doesn't end here. We seek to end sexual violence before it creates harm, which is why we invest so heavily in prevention and education. We believe that when we plant the seeds of empathy, autonomy, consent and accountability early, we create a thriving community that is safer for everyone.

The social good enterprise is based on a radical notion- that the keepers of visions like ours must be accountable to our communities. The Board of Directors is what makes this possible. OUR PROGRAMS

therapy + support groups

Our in-house clinical therapy and wellness program provides free clinical therapy and support groups in English and Spanish to survivors who otherwise wouldn't be able to access services.

community education

Our educational programs are offered in both school districts in Orange County with age-appropriate materials for awareness and prevention strategies. We also offer several adult, custom, parent, and professional trainings.

24-hour helplines

Our staff and trained volunteers provide emotional support, resources, and referrals to help guide survivors through their healing process. Our three helpline options (phone, text, and online chat) are available everyday, 24 hours a day.

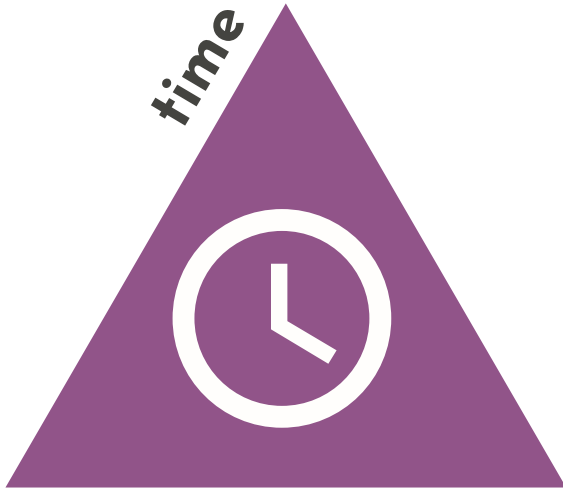

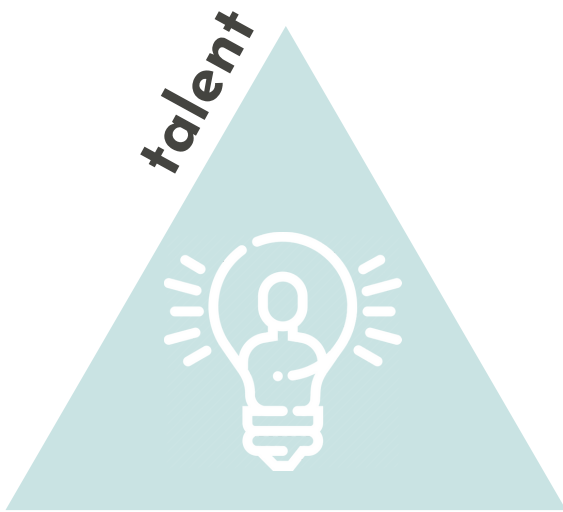
